

To the Honorable, the Circuit Court of Milwaukee County, Wisconsin. a native of GERMANY about years of age, respectfully showeth that your petitioner an alien and a resident of the city and county of Milwaukee, is desirous of becoming a citizen of the United States of America, that in pursuance of the several acts of Congress passed on that subject, he made a declaration of his intention to become a citizen, and a report and registry of his nativity, age, allegiance, emigration and arrival in the United States, comformable to said acts, before the Munechal Court, for of Milwaukee, State of Wisconsin , as more fully appears by the certified copy of said declaration hereto annexed that he has resided continuously within the limits, and under the jurisdiction of the United States for five years last past, and for one year last past within the State of Wisconsin; that he has never borne any hereditary title, or been of any of the orders of nobility in the kingdom whence he came or elsewhere; that he is not a disbeliever in or opposed to all organized government, that he is not a member of or affiliated with any organization entertaining and teaching such disbelief in or opposition to all organized government, or who advocates or teaches the duty, necessity or propriety of the unlawful assaulting or killing of any officer or officers, either of specific individuals or of officers generally, of the government of the United States or of any other organized government, because of his or their official character, that he has not violated any of the provisions of an Act of Congress entitled: "An Act to Regulate the Immigration of Aliens into the United States," approved March 3rd, 1903; that he is attached to the principles of the Constitution of the United States, and well disposed to the good order and happiness of the same, and that it is bona fide his intention to become a Citizen thereof. Your petitioner therefore prays your Honorable Court, that upon making proof of all matters and things set forth in this petition and in conformity with the conditions, stipulations and restrictions contained in the several Acts passed upon the subject by the Congress of the United States, he may be admitted to become a Citizen of the United States of America. Dated Milwaukee, July. and being duly sworn, according to law, say that they are Citizens of the United States, and residents of the City and County of Milwaukee and State of Wisconsin; that they are well acquainted with the above named petitioner for upwards of years, that during said period he has behaved himself as a man of good moral character, attached to the principles of the Constitution of the United States and well disposed to the good order and happiness of the same; that all the material facts set forth in his petition to this Honorable Court are true to the best of their knowledge and belief.
