To the Honorable, the Circuit Court of Milwaukee County, Wisconsin.

The Petition of

Frank Petlejowski

a native of GERMANY

about 40 years of age, respectfully showeth that your petitioner an alien and a resident of the city and county of Milwaukee, is desirous of becoming a citizen of the United States of America, that in pursuance of the several acts of Congress passed on that subject, he made a declaration of his intention to become a citizen, and a report and registry of his nativity, age,

allegiance, emigration and arrival in the United States, conformable to said acts, before the Municipal Court, for the city & county of Milwaukee, State of Wisconsin on the 28 day of Oct 1890,

as more fully appears by the certified copy of said declaration hereto annexed that

he has resided continuously within the limits, and under the jurisdiction of the United States for five years last past, and for one year last past within the State of Wisconsin; that he has never borne any hereditary title, or been of any of the orders of nobility in the kingdom whence he came or elsewhere; that he is not a disbeliever in or opposed to all organized government, that he is not a member of or affiliated with any organization entertaining and teaching such disbelief in or opposition to all organized government, or who advocates or teaches the duty, necessity or propriety of the unlawful assaulting or killing of any officer or officers, either of specific individuals or of officers generally, of the government of the United States or of any other organized government, because of his or their official character, that he has not violated any of the provisions of an Act of Congress entitled: "An Act to Regulate the Immigration of Aliens into the United States," approved March 3rd, 1903; that he is attached to the principles of the Constitution of the United States, and well disposed to the good order and happiness of the same, and that it is bona fide his intention to become a Citizen thereof.

Your petitioner therefore prays your Honorable Court, that upon making proof of all matters and things set forth in this petition and in conformity with the conditions, stipulations and restrictions contained in the several Acts passed upon the subject by the Congress of the United States, he may be admitted to become a Citizen of the United States of America.
